Wings large and long, the fourth quill-feather the longest. Legs strong; first-feathered to the junction of the toes. Feet strong; the last phalanx of each toe covered by three large scales: claws strong, hooked.

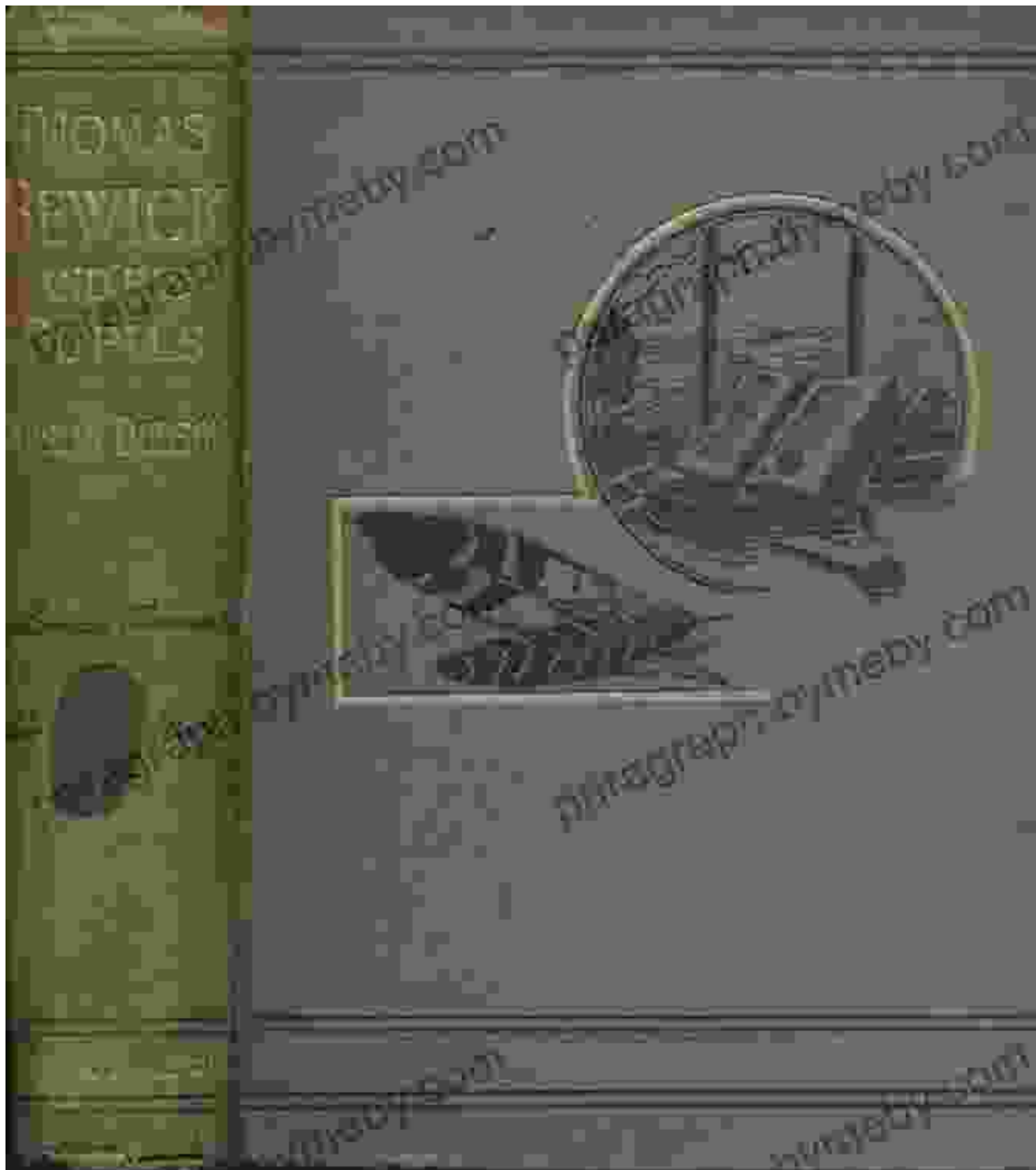

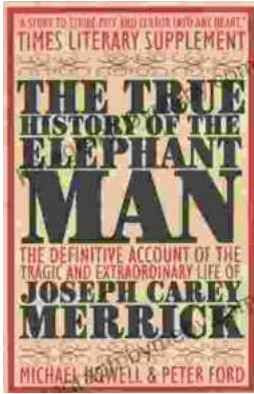


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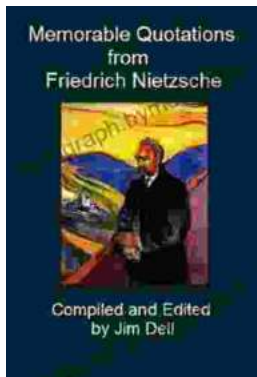
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
