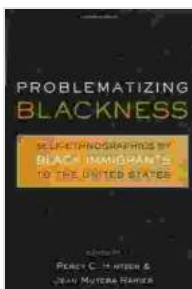


Self Ethnographies by Black Immigrants to the United States: Crosscurrents in Experience and Identity

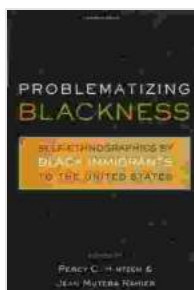

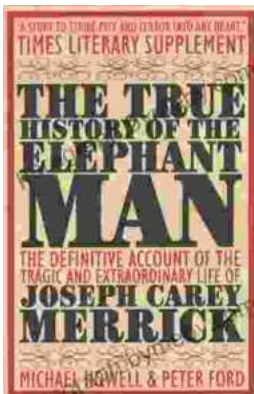

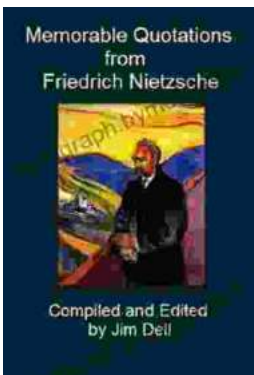
