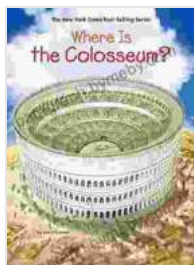

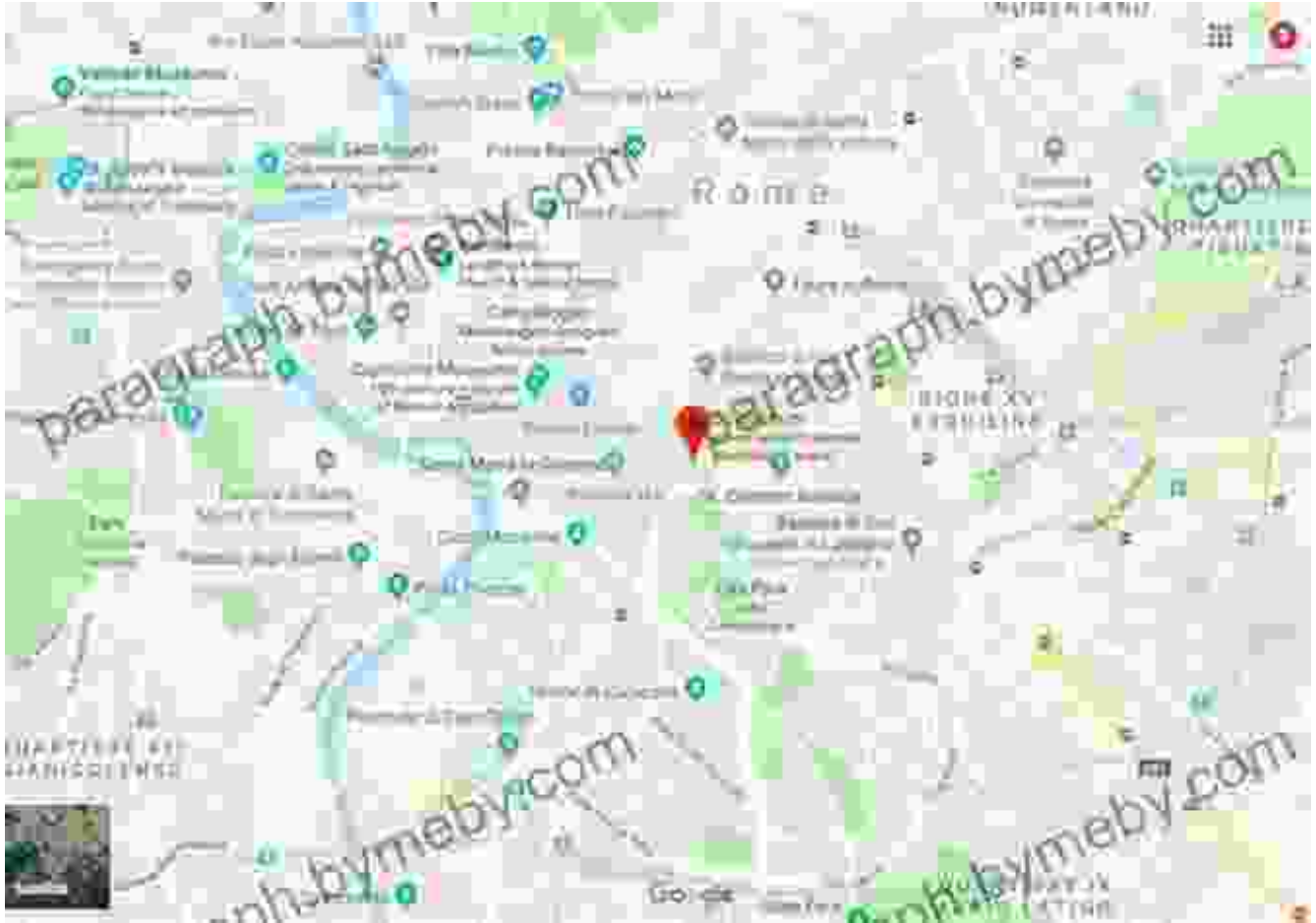


The interior of the Colosseum, showing the seating arrangement

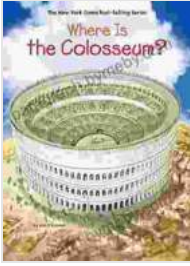

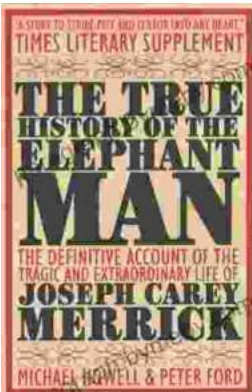

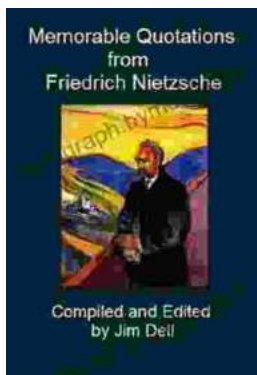
